The symptoms of blood cancer can vary depending on the specific type, however, recurring infections, unexpected weight loss, fever, night sweats, fatigue, swollen lymph nodes, easy bruising or bleeding, and bone pain are some common symptoms that may indicate the presence of a blood cancer. Blood cancers are typically diagnosed through a combination of blood tests, bone marrow biopsy, imaging tests and lymph node biopsy. While it may not be possible to prevent blood cancers entirely, adopting a healthy lifestyle, avoiding known risk factors, and staying informed about your health can help reduce the risk. Prompt attention to any unusual symptoms can aid in early detection and diagnosis, whilst can significantly improve the effectiveness of treatment and the overall prognosis.
